Sterling work from Dulwich College team

sustain the relationship long-term, we stand a good chance of their efforts making a real difference.

As always, Gerry, Shane, Natalie and the rest of the Park's team have been instrumental in making this arrangement work."

Cleaner, Green, Safer

Given the number of accidents, as well as reports of excessively fast **cycling in the park**, the Friends obtained a grant from Southwark's Cleaner, Greener, Safer fund to procure signs that remind everyone that the park has shared routes that are not part of the public highway. The eye-catching signs are now in place.

They may be cute as goslings, but **Canada geese** numbers in the park have increased considerably since the fencing around the lake island was taken down around three years ago. To act as a disincentive to breeding pairs in the coming seasons, and reduce the birds' dominance amongst the local species, the Friends have this year applied for a grant to reinstate the fencing.





Some of the original **boundary oaks**, including this magnificent specimen by the lake, are showing signs of stress – because of the compressed soil around their bases, limiting access of rainwater; and also, alarmingly, because of the amount of canine urine that seeps into the soil.

The Friends have applied for a grant to ring fence this beauty and allow for the creation of better soil conditions around its base.

Rob Colicci writes:


"The cafe has been open almost a year and since the refurbishment we have increased the number of visitors to the cafe four-fold, and we are experiencing a very high number of

On 7th October Helen Hayes MP made a speech to the assembled Dulwich parkrun throng, to mark the 13th anniversary of the inaugural parkrun in Bushey Park in 2004. But the day also marked the first anniversary of Helen's first parkrun. Now she has run the event forty-three times!



Helen explained how her initial reluctance to run blossomed into enthusiasm, as she began to realise not only the physical benefits, but the mental ones too: running is a perfect way to relieve stress. There are now 476 separate weekly parkrun events and the runners have covered an astonishing combined 89,046,275km.
